Getting the Most Out of Homework

Q: As a parent, what is my role with homework?

A: Children should be as independent as possible with homework, but sometimes that takes time. There is a lot parents can do to support their children:

- Check to see that your children understand assignments. If there is a problem, work through an example with your child.
- Sign your young child's homework. This reminds you to check over homework and see that it is finished. It also allows the teacher to know you have seen it.
- Follow up to be sure homework is being turned in to the teacher.
- Contact the teacher if you don't understand the homework or your child has a special problem. Teachers benefit from feedback about homework assignments and are happy to help.
- Look for homework daily. Assume that your children have homework Monday-Thursday.
- Try to be home and available during homework time so that your children know that you value homework.
- Praise your child for a job well done. Encourage the good work your children do and comment on improvements they have made.
- In addition to assigned homework, read to or read with your child. Talk about appropriate current events. Find opportunities to read, talk, and learn while in the car, at home, or in the store.

DID YOU KNOW?

- ❖ Parents/guardians may visit the classroom (including the playground) at the school's request or request to make a formal observation. Making an appointment with the school at least two school days in advance of an observation is not only a courtesy and a requirement by the Superintendent, but enables the parent/guardian to schedule the observation for the maximum benefit. Teachers cannot stop teaching to confer with the parents/guardians who stop by without an appointment. Parents/guardians may schedule up to two classroom observations of up to forty-five minutes in duration each grading period. Staff accompanies visitors to the classroom. Siblings should not attend. Teachers will be happy to discuss the observation at a mutually convenient time. Parents/guardians are welcome at any time to visit the cafeteria and eat lunch with their child.
- ❖ Absences from school are considered lawful only if they are accompanied by a medical note. This can be a doctor's note indicating an illness or a medical appointment. It would also be considered a medical absence if the school nurse sends a child home from school.
- ❖ School system policy states that students in elementary school with eight unlawful absences might be considered for retention.
- ❖ Regular, structured homework assignments are an extension of classroom instruction. Elementary students usually spend ten minutes on homework in first grade and up to an hour in fifth grade.
- ❖ Elementary school students may not possess cell phones at school.
- ❖ Valuable items (including games and toys) and large sums of money should not be brought to school. We do not take responsibility for valuables brought to school.
- ❖ Fifth graders choose their music class: band, chorus or orchestra. Fifth graders cannot choose their musical preference during the year.
- ❖ The goal of Charles County Public Schools is to provide a quality educational program for all students in an environment that is conducive to learning. There are times, however, when an individual may have a concern. The first step in resolving a concern is to address it with the teacher or staff member who is most closely and directly involved. Please contact the school and schedule an appointment.
- ❖ Please remember that children under the age of 18 may not transport medication to and from school. Only adults may transport medication. This includes prescription medications, pain relievers (Advil/Tylenol), cough syrup, cough drops, and medicated lotions/creams. All medicated items must stay locked in our school Health Room.
